- 2. APPROVAL OF PREVIOUS MINUTES

CHAIR/EVP

3. BRIEFING ON THE NEW STUDENT ACADEMIC COMPLAINTS STATUTE AND PROCEDURES

Presented by David Hayward.

- The existing statute was made in 2012 and covers academic complaints. This will be replaced by the two documents: principles and procedures, as attached to the agenda.
- Scope of complaints: Admissions to programs are no longer in scope. Disputes for programs will later be fitted in per program; this statute is not to cover that.
- Marking is not in scope. Failing in how the assessment has been designed is in scope. This is clarified better in this statute. Delivery of courses and post-grad supervision included.
- There is a 3-month time limit for making a complaint.
- Informal and formal processes acknowledging that in many situations, informal processes
 will be faster and have less risk if they work. If the informal process is inappropriate, then can
 have the formal process. The 3-month limit does not apply here if you have been through the
 informal process and then switched to a formal one. Informal is not prescribed what that
 looks like.
- Have the ability to compile complaints multiple students, for efficiency. However, individuals still get individual resolutions.
- Role of the academic head key individuals to receive and undertake an investigation.
 Conflict of interest is made clear in the new statute.
- Right to respond and request a review handled by Provost.
- Better record and gives a report on the complaints to key committees such as SCG.
- The policy is inclusive for students and safe and free from bias. AUSA advocacy team would be informed on how to navigate the processes in order to assist students.
- The system is not yet set up. Work with AUSA to make sure Advocacy is up to date with any portal that gets set up for accessibility.

4. UPDATE ON CANVAS BASELINE PRACTICES PROJECT

Presented by Steve Leichtweis (Head of the eLearning Group, Ranga Auaha Ako | Learning &

Teaching Design Team)

The goal has been to create consistency regardless of faculty, on Canvas pages.

- The project is coming to an end.
- Has been underway in most faculties except for medical and health sciences.

- Templates can be downloaded into the courses to provide ease for the course coordinators.
- Started with stage one and two courses. Positive feedback. Staff understand the need for accessibility.
- About 600 courses have been updated, end of year, about 700. Over 3000 courses at the
 University. Quality assurance is hard this is where student feedback comes in. Then turned
 over to faculties to complete and do this themselves. Staff have been trained. Student voice
 and feedback are critical for this.
- Accessibility issues with pictures and cartoons.

How do we ensure that this baseline is maintained?

- No question in SET to provide that feedback.
- Could have question prompts for class reps on canvas.
- No one at the university holds the academics accountable for this canvas change.
- The lecturer should be able to make changes based on feedback.
- Templates provided directly to class reps? What it should look like.
- Question regarding Gen AI and canvas. Canvas chatbox as a search button is a function that is looking to be included in the future.

5. CANVAS UPDATES

An update from Gemma Sinclair (Product Manager, Digital Services), around enabling personal pronouns on Canvas.

- Pronoun options were checked and confirmed with the Student Engagement team. It is a dropdown box of options. PVC Equity advised on the communication plan.
- Shows up in discussions, the people tab, own profile and user settings. Instructors can see in a few other areas.
- Users can edit in settings.
- To advertise in the Teachwell newsletter and the Loop.
- A canvas announcement could be good. (Note that this has since been actioned).

6. UPDATE ON THE NEW LIBRARY SPACES

Presented by Justin Horan (Associate Director, Student Hubs).

The new library spaces have been completed and thus far received good reviews.

- Students can book on demand to make space for studying using a QR code.
- Māori and Pasikifa collection and space. Work with student groups to use and book the spaces. Engagement advisors working with students.
- Reo space for practising Te Reo.

- Feedback has been listened to, such as adding height to some tables to fit the chairs better.
- More tables were purchased, so students aren't moving them around when needed.
- Committing to a semester review.
- Monitors for the booking system are there to let you know when the space is free. On pillars.
 Working to draw more attention to the screens.
- Touch screens could be used for bookings like in the Davis Library.
- Justin to check if rooms are locked on weekends.
- Intent to continue this work on other floors; however, the question is on the life of this building and whether it is worth the investment if a new building is being considered.

7. CURRICULUM FRAMEWORK TRANSFORMATION

There are six new Transdisciplinary Futures courses, making 12 in total. The list of courses being reviewed for approval were discussed in the previous Student Council meeting.

- Democracy
- War and Peace
- Al and society
- Our place in space
- Hazards
- Environmental Future
- Contemporary sexualities
- Lifestyle Behaviours
- Health and Wellbeing
- Future Food
- Renewable Energy Transition

There will likely be 3 cycles for each course, then the course reviewed. Students will be giving feedback right from te very beginning. Looked at the graduate profile in the making of these changes.
